THINK ABOUT THE CHILDREN

Jesus said,

"Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs."

- Matthew 19:14

Jesus made it pretty clear that he had a soft spot for children. He even said that we were to become like little children if we wanted to enter the kingdom. So what are we, as congregations, doing about the children in our midst?



During this month of August, many of us are meeting to finalize the details of our Christian Education program that will start in September. Some congregations are no doubt finalizing the details of their Child Protection Policy.

Those of us with children or grandchildren are engaging in back-to-school shopping for them, but what are we doing about the somewhat invisible children in our communities? I am talking about the children with unmet needs.

There are really good sales on school supplies, but they are still not affordable for many. If your city or county has a school supply drive, I encourage you to participate in it. If you are in a rural school district, as am I, recognize that some parents are unable to get to the distribution point on the assigned day and time to pick up the supplies for their child. It is possible to work with your local school to provide them with supplies. Many teachers would also appreciate a donation of supplies for their classrooms.

Those children who qualify for free or reduced price lunches may also need to receive a backpack of food for the weekend. In most of our Presbytery, the backpack program is run through Great Plains Food Bank with the cooperation of local food pantries. Donations of food, or money to provide it, are always needed. If you prefer a more hands-on approach, volunteers are often needed to fill the backpacks. There is also a need for facilities to serve food to the children through the summer months. Could your church be a site for a feeding program? Could you do a week of Vacation Bible School yet this month, invite everyone, and include a meal?

Back-to-school is a time for new clothes for many of our children. Some parents cannot afford a new outfit for their child. One of our local shelters engages with local donors to provide new back-to-school outfits for children living at the shelter. I am guessing that there are more children who could use new clothes. School counselors and social workers, and county Social Service workers can probably provide you with sizes needed to make an anonymous donation for their clients.

Jesus made it clear that the kingdom of heaven belongs to the children. Let us treat them like we believe it.

MIDDLE SCHOOL MISSION TRIP

This past June thirty-seven Middle School Youth and adult leaders boarded a bus in Fargo and headed to the Minneapolis/St. Paul area for a long weekend of mission work and fun together. Our 32 youth represented Presbyterian and ELCA churches from 10 different cities in North Dakota and Minnesota. The youth quickly got to know each other and created great and diverse friendship groups over their four days together.

The first day after travel was spent serving two charities. Our morning began with The Sheridan Story, a growing organization which responds to the needs of the over 200,000 children in Minnesota living in food insecurity, not always knowing where they will receive their next meal. The youth

gathered to learn about the work The Sheridan Story is accomplishing, and quickly joined in helping. I have personally never seen a group of Middle School youth work so hard and so quickly. Jobs were assigned, kids got to packing, and we finished our goal 30 minutes before expected! Youth packed bags full of protein, veggies, fruit, and necessities in an assembly-like system. There were youth preparing back-up food, making sure every item got recycled, and that everything was taken care of. It was incredible work done and we were able to pack 1,320 packs of food in only one hour!

After our morning spent in Roseville, we visited Galilee Lutheran Church of St. Paul, organizer of the Rice St. Gardens. Pastor Dana enthusiastically shared with our youth her missionary work around the



world, and told us of the garden that has been prepared for

refugees and immigrants in the Twin Cities. Over 200 plots are available for families to use to plant their own gardens. They are responsible for taking care of the gardens and have created an incredible community within the space on busy Rice St. near St. Paul. Our youth spent time enjoying the beautiful garden space, helping with any clean up needed, but mostly meeting the various garden caretakers from different countries all over the world.

Our last service stop was with Feed My Starving Children (FMSC), which actually has dozens of sites all over the Twin Cities. The youth learned about the great need of starving children in the world and the work FMSC is doing to provide for them. We then

packed nutritional meals for families, completing over 100 boxes-feeding 20,113 people. It was fast paced work, where our kids excelled and enjoyed themselves in this act of community service.

Our theme was taken from Galatians 5:14 "you shall love your neighbor as yourself", and our youth found great work in providing food for our neighbors in Minneapolis, St. Paul, and all over the world! They were challenged to "love their neighbor" as they got to know 37 different personalities, and deal with a busy, tiring schedule. We were together for only four days where we fit in three different mission sites and visits to Minnehaha Falls, the Mall of America, and Valley Fair.

Our Middle School youth did an incredible job on this trip, and were able to grow in their faith from the experience. We look forward to more opportunities for youth to connect within the Presbytery and in our own youth groups here at home.
